# Introduction

This public consultation is being conducted as part of the evaluation of Regulation (EC) No 1223/2009 (the Cosmetic Products Regulation, CPR). The CPR applies to all cosmetic products made available on the EU market. The main objective of the CPR is twofold. It aims to provide unified rules within the EU both to protect consumer health by ensuring that cosmetics meet strict safety requirements and to ensure the functioning of the internal market for cosmetic products.

The CPR is relevant to manufacturers, importers, distributors and consumers. One particularly important aspect is the appointment of a 'responsible person' to oversee product compliance. The Regulation also lays down that products must be clearly labelled with ingredients, instructions for use, and any necessary precautions, among other things. Once products are on the market, Member States monitor them through market surveillance to ensure they continue to meet the required standards.

This first evaluation of the CPR aims to assess how the Regulation has been applied, if it has delivered on its objectives, and if it remains fit for purpose. This is in view of the green and digital transitions, the competitiveness of EU businesses, the potential for simplification and current developments (e.g. online and bulk sales, digital labelling, products used in professional settings).

Additionally, the evaluation will gather evidence on all pertinent scientific and technological factors affecting human health and the environment, along with legal, economic and other developments related to cosmetic products. It will offer a comprehensive view of the current landscape, providing clear benchmarks for assessing changes, progress, and challenges encountered.

The objective of this public consultation is to gather insights from a range of stakeholders with direct or indirect involvement in the implementation of the CPR. It will investigate various aspects of the Regulation, including its effectiveness, efficiency, relevance, EU added value and alignment with EU policies and instruments. The public consultation will also help to gather qualitative and quantitative data to underpin these assessments.
